


altogether. There's an interesting theory called the "Dunning-Kruger Effect" that maps out what this can look like for most people trying to learn a new skill. It looks something like this:




On the X-Axis, we have wisdom; or how much you know about the skill on a scale from "know-nothing" to "guru". On the Y-Axis, we have confidence in your ability to do said skill on a scale from low to high.

The first milestone you reach as you've started the learning process is the "Peak of 'Mt. Stupid'". Very silly name, I know. Think of the phrase "ignorance is bliss": you don't know what you don't know! Since you've started from ground zero and know very little about the subject; any progress you make is positive and seems to be quite a lot. Then you reach this peak and start to realize maybe you don't know as much as you thought, or you see someone else who has been doing this thing for a while and so their knowledge and skills are incredible. This tends to make people fall into the "valley of despair" where things have now gotten more difficult, you start to realize more and more that there are so many layers to this new skill that you hadn't even thought of. 


